OPERATION ASTRATEGIES

Oncea pandemicis declaredin the province of Ontario, the NCDSB vill institute the following operational strategies to ensure a timely and responsible esponse to the pandemic:

- \$ School Principals shall advise a SupervisoryOfficer of absenteeismrates specific to influenz asymptoms each day by 10:00a.m. Trends will be documented by the principal and superintendent.
- From 10:30 11:30 each day, the PandemicResponseTeamwill review the data and makenecessaryecommendations the Director Education. Required hews releases and media communiques will be drafted as required by the Director of Education his/her designate.

It is also important to note that during a pandemic any guidance provided by health officials that conflicts with this information will supercede the NCDSB guidelines.

Furthermore, decisions will be made based on community conditions, and operational guidelines may be instituted at different times in different locations across the school board.
